# ROADS TO ZANSKAR VALLEY

In the middle of nowhere

Zanskar Valley is one of the most secluded parts of India. Located in the heart of the state of Jammu and Kashmir, it is like a Shangri-La. Though, Chadar Trek across the frozen Zanskar River is popular among tourists during the winter months, the place has many other attractions too.

More than the destination itself, a road trip from Kargil to Zanskar Valley is spellbinding. The roads to Zanskar Valley are very challenging. However, the sights of huge green fields, high mountains, beautiful monasteries and lovely people on the way are totally worth it.

The Drang-Drung Glacier - the second largest glacier in India



The road from Kargil goes down south passing by the beautiful Suru Valley. On the way, there are some mosques in the backdrop of scenic landscapes, peek-a-boo moments with the Nun Kun peaks and magnificent views of the Parkachik glacier.

After approx. 127km of journey, the roads will lead you to Rangdum - a small but scenic village. Little ahead is the 200-year old Rangdum Monastery. The serenity of this place is indescribable. It's worth spending some time here. The panoramic views from the monastery is breathtaking.

25 km ahead of Rangdum is the Penzi La, located at a height of 14,436 ft. above sea level. The pass is rightly called the 'Gateway to Zanskar'. This is the only way that connects the people of Zanskar 1. Bardhan Gompa is a 17thcentury Buddhist monastery located on a rock outgrowth beside the Lungnak River

to the outside world. As you move ahead, the culture changes significantly. The Buddhist chortems are present all around the valley.

Further beyond is the surreal Drang-Drung glacier, the second largest in India after Siachen. It looks like a superhighway to heaven.

Go further down to the plains of Zanskar valley. The rough roads will test your driving skills. In fact, in some stretches, there are no roads at all. The seasoned drivers use their experience and guesswork to find out the right trail to go on.

After passing through some scenic landscapes, Padum is a stopover. It is the administrative center of Zanskar and the only town. Explore the vast landscapes and monasteries of this region.

#### **CLIMATE**

Zanskar is a semi-arid desert in high altitudes. During the summer months, day temperature varies from 20 to 35 degrees. At night, the temperature drops significantly. It is extremely cold in winters and temperature drops to about minus 25 degrees. All the roads are closed during the winters and Zanskar is totally cutoff from the mainland.

#### ROUTE

The best way is to fly to Srinagar or Leh and take the road to Kargil and then down to Zanskar. Starting from Srinagar is little easier for human body as it is at a much lower altitude than Leh.





#### HOW TO GO

The only way is to hire a taxi, a self-driven car can be a big challenge as there are hardly any roads on some places and needs lots of off-roading. Solo travelling can be difficult as there are very less public transport. There are fully packed shared taxis available, which leave Kargil at a specific time.

July is a good time to visit Zanskar Valley. The best will be if you can include a festival during your trip. The Ladakh festival calendar has a listing of all the festivals in the valley. During festivals, people from far away villages visit Zanskar. Some walk for about 3 days to reach here. The festivals have a mask dance called Chham, where the monks dance with the beats of drums and trumpets.

#### WHERE TO STAY

Though Padum has good accommodations, there are very limited places to stay in Rangdum. There are some basic homestays. The Nun Kun Camp, Rangdum is the only decent place to stay. It's located right below the Rangdum monastery. Kargil has a good range of hotels for lodging.

#### TIPS

Carry packed food and enough water with you for the journey as there are hardly any places to eat or drink on the way.



#### If photography tour is on your mind... -

In Ladakh, there are immense opportunities for photographers – the landscapes, culture, monasteries and people.

Photography is allowed in most monasteries, some with a nominal fee. However, look out for signboards mentioning about photography. In some monasteries, it is not allowed. Remember, the purpose of a monastery is to pray at peace. Clicking too many pictures makes the place noisy.

Do not use flash inside monasteries. It is very distracting and sometimes offending. Besides that, it can also damage the old and rare paintings displayed there.

Always ask before you shoot people. Though most people are very friendly, some may not like it or may charge a fee.

o journey in India is complete without the train journeys. Spread like a giant spider web, the Indian Railways covers approximately 65,000 km and carries 30 million passengers a day. Joining width and length of the country, the railways is touching the unique element of the nation – its diversity.

So if you're a traveller (and not a tourist) who is craving to sneak into undiscovered cultures, gaze into unexplored landscapes and soak in the refreshing air, relish a 'railish' journey as we bring you some of the most enthralling train routes in India that offer totally scenic landscapes – from wide seas, steep mountain slopes to narrow valleys. Let's go through the list and get a ringside view of India's most gorgeous landscapes.

# 📔 Kangra Valley Railway

Himachal Pradesh is unquestionably a bliss for the travellers. The snow-covered peaks of the Himalayas, dense green forests, enchanting passes and vibrant vistas at Himachal lure adventure, nature and leisure travellers from different corners of the globe.

Kangra Valley is one of the major attractions of Himachal. If you want to feel the thrills of deep gorges, river bridges and amazing flora, Kangra Valley Railway operates between the picturesque valleys of Pathankot and Joginder Nagar. The amazing railway journey covers a trail of 164 km and offers the most charming views of the Himalayas, mesmerizing curves and picturesque valleys of this Himalayan State of India.

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## Konkan Railway

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The railway line runs along the Konkan coast of India from the Village Tokur, a small town in coastal district - Dakshina Kannada in Karnataka state, to the train station, Roha in the state of Maharashtra through Goa, along the west coast of India and the mountain chain called 'Western Ghats'.

Konkan Railway's journey through the Ghats provides stunning views of Arabian Sea beaches, distant mountains, mysterious tunnels, the green horizon merging with the orange skyline during sunset and stormy falls, while traveling from Mumbai to Goa. Do not forget to take out your handicam or camera and capture the highlights of the amazing journey.

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# Tamil Nadu - Rameshwaram

Ever imagined yourself surrounded by nothing but the expansive water bodies? Train travel from Mandapam in Tamil Nadu to Rameshwaram on Pamban Island will give you all the 'Life of Pi' thrills and adventure apart from calm and serenity.

One of the most beautiful train routes in India intersects the ocean through the second longest bridge of India, the Palk Strait, which is the only route that connects mainland India to Pamban Island. The bridge, the second longest in India, is touted as one of the most thrilling train routes of India.

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## Jaipur - Jaisalmer

The royal Rajasthan trip will get an extra bright shade with a train trip from Jaipur to Jaisalmer. If you're opting for the 'Desert Queen', it will take 6 hours to reach the destination.

The journey through the desert offers diversified topography like the various shades of golden, grazing camels in the unending desert expanses, vegetation and scattered settlements of the desert inhabitants. In all, the train trip will present the feel of desert safari before reaching the land of the Golden Fort.



# Darjeeling Himalayan Railway

(New Jalpaiguri-Darjeeling)

Initially built as a tramway to exploit the pricedifference of potatoes between Darjeeling and Siliguri, the UNESCO World Heritage Site - fondly known as 'Toy Train' takes its lovers through the scenic hills and mountains on the way at a speed of 12 km/h. The 2ft narrow-gauge blue train curves around tea plantation, rolls alongside breezy forests and takes its passengers amid the swirls of cloud drifting up the hillside. Famed for its loops, reverses and spiral at Agony Point, the little toy train is a hit among the locals and tourists.



## Nilgiri Mountain Railway

If you've not seen this route already, watch Shahrukh Khan's peppy song 'Chhaiyya Chhaiyya' to get the glimpse of the Nilgiri Mountain Railway that runs between Mettupalayam to Ooty. The train, covering 45 km track, takes its passengers at an elevation of over 7000 feet to present the most beautiful perspective of the nature packed with lush green hills, tea gardens and tall girder bridges. The exclusivity of the route is that it passes through 16 tunnels and 250 bridges on the way. This mountain railway is listed as the World Heritage Site in 2005.



## The Kerala Anubhavam

(Ernakulam-Kollam-Trivandrum)

Nothing is better than taking a train ride from Ernakulam (Cochin) to Trivandrum via Kollam (Quilon) to experience the God's own country – Kerala. The route presents a complete holiday package from the pristine lakes, enchanting backwaters, a glance of the rural life of Kerala and the coconut palms fencing the water channels. **m**

# 10 most haunted places in India



ndia is often considered as the land of undiscovered mystery. For centuries, travellers from around the world, who have made their journey to India, have been thrilled by the mystical energy that surrounds the country.

Even the abandoned places in India have become places of interest for those who are fascinated by the supernatural. For those who are too afraid to visit these places in person, reading about and sharing stories of these mysterious places in India might be the next best thing! It should also be noted that these ghostly places in India have come under the spotlight as they have been visited by 'supernatural detectives' wanting to experience or debunk the strange events occurring at these places. In fact, the modern-day 'Ghostbusters' camp at these places overnight to record any strange occurrences, which they monitor before jumping to any final conclusions.

So steel your nerves and take a peek into the list of haunted places in India, which have sprung to the forefront either on the basis of what many people have deduced, by way of research or just by word-of-mouth.

# 1. Indian Ghost Town of Bhangarh, Rajasthan

The Indian Ghost Town of Bhangarh, Rajasthan is one of the scariest places in India to visit, in addition to being one of the most abandoned places in India. However, this tag has not perturbed visitors from making frequent trips to this ghost town.

The town lures many visitors from all around the country. However, it should be noted that if you decide to visit the town after sunset, you will not be allowed. In fact, the Archaeological Survey of India has forbidden access of the place between sunset and sunrise. According to one of the legends, the city of Bhangarh was cursed by a wizard named Singhiya, who was in love with the princess of Bhangarh. Even before his death, the wizard casted a dark spell on the palace and the town, which caused its doom. Despite the story surrounding the ruins, it still is a fascinating place to visit. In fact, it has also been officially promoted as a tourist destination. However, once the sun sets, the place becomes deserted, leaving the darkness to engulf it once again till the next morning.

#### 2. Dumas Beach, Gujarat

Dumas Beach in Gujarat is located near Surat, one of the developed cities

of Gujarat. The beach draws countless visitors almost every day as legend has it that the winds, which blow fiercely, come along with whispers. It is also believed that the beach was for long used as a Hindu burial ground, therefore, it has been the resting place for many souls.

#### 3. Tunnel 33, Shimla

Tunnel 33 has instilled fear in the minds of travellers being one of the creepiest haunted places in India. This tunnel falls on the Shimla-Kalka railway stretch. It is the longest and straightest tunnel located close to the Barog railway station.

The tunnel holds historical significance. It was supposed to be built by Captain Barog, a British engineer. As he could not complete the work assigned to him, he was fired from the job and was ridiculed. In

depression, he went to the tunnel and shot himself. It is believed that his friendly spirit still haunts the tunnel. Many paranormal activities were reported inside the tunnel in the past.

#### 4. The Mansion, Residency Road, Pune

Have you ever been to Residency Road in Pune? Did you come across the frightening side of the Mansion? No wonder, if terrifying sounds, weird laughter and loud screams have also accompanied you late at night. The locals tell a tale that this place is haunted by an old lady.

Those who have experienced this call the Mansion one of the most haunted places in India. Don't take up a challenge and explore this place, because the residents here vouch for its spookiness.

#### 5. Three Kings Church, Goa

The Three Kings Church is located in Goa. As per the dark story, there were three kings, who were fighting to get this property and even killed each other in this battle. Locals and visitors claim that this church is possessed by the spirits of these three kings.

They believe that their soul roam around the premises.







#### 6. Towers of Silence, Mumbai

Towers of Silence is situated at the Malabar hills in Mumbai. The circular, raised structure was built by Zoroastrians for excarnation – i.e. for dead bodies to be exposed to carrion birds. As per the rituals and customs, this community leave those who are dead on the rooftop of this tower, to be eaten by the vultures.

These spine tingling rituals are further backed by stories that

say that these towers are an abode to paranormal happenings. It is believed that the ghostly forces originate from this cemetery at the Grand Parsi Towers.

#### 7. Writers Building, Kolkata

The Writers' Building was an age-old building from the British era. It was built for the writers who worked for the East India Company. Unfortunately, it was destroyed in a natural disaster. The government then rebuilt a new Writer's Building at the same place, which is believed to be possessed by the victims. According to another story, the soul of Late Captain Simpson who worked with the British East India Company dwells in this building ever since being murdered by three revolutionaries. Residents claim that they have heard footsteps and voices post sunset.

#### 8. Agrasen ki Baoli, Hailey Road, New Delhi

Do you know how it feels to be stalked? Being constantly watched and followed, wherever you go. It is even more terrifying when the entity follow-


ing you is not living and unknown. The Agrasen ki Baoli is an age-old step well located on Hailey Road in New Delhi.

It is very popular for its antiquated architecture, but unfortunately has no records of who built it and when. According to the sources, people who have visited Agrasen ki Baoli claim that something invisible followed them and the faster they ran, the quicker it chased. Presently, the site is being taken care by the ASI as it holds historical significance.

#### 9. Jatinga, Assam

Mass suicide has always managed to freak us out. Imagine walking on a road and watching birds fall to death. These are mass suicide committed by birds. Jatinga, a village in Assam, has witnessed this paranormal phenomenon for years. What is strange is the fact that this happens only on no-moon days between 6.00 PM to 9.30 PM, during the months of September and October. It is also said that these bird-suicides happen only on a stretch of 1 mile by 600 ft. land.

Many have tried to explain this occurrence through theories, but none of them have been convincing. This unusual happening intrigues several travellers and researchers.

#### 10. Ramoji Film City, Hyderabad

Ramoji Film City is a famous shooting site for movies. Many actors have confessed that they have seen ghosts in the mirror when they were getting ready for the shoot. The light men here have also witnessed some spooky incidents. The film city is built on war grounds of the Nizam sultans. It is believed that the soldiers died in the war are trying to make their presence felt.

# A getaway in the lap of nature

The hills of Malnadu in Karnataka feature virgin wildernesses like the Agumbe rainforest and the picturesque Kudremukh hill.

As you drive from Bangalore, you come to the hill town of Chikmagalur famous for its coffee estates and nearby peaks -Mullayangiri and Baba Budangiri, which are among the highest in Southern India. Chikmagalur has some splendid resorts and plantation retreats that are worth a few nights.

When you want to get away to a more secluded place, take the road to Kudremukh. This little hill station gets its name from the horse face like Kudremukh peak, which is among Karnataka's three highest. The chain of rolling hills with a mosaic of natural grassland and shola forests is superbly scenic in the rains - an average annual rainfall of 7000 mm ensures the lush evergreen vegetation of Kudremukh. The open grasslands are excellent for long walks together. The Kudremukh National Park is home for many endangered species. Upasana is a place to stay situated overlooking the picturesque village of Samse, bordering the Kudremukh National Park at an elevation of 960 metres above sea level.

From Kudremukh, you can drive to Agumbe to enjoy the views of the rain forest and the Jog Falls, one of India's highest waterfalls.

#### Madikeri A honeymoon in the hills

Madikeri in the hills of the Kodagu district, also well known as Coorg, is a popular hill destination for holidays because of its forests, plantations, rivers, scenic viewpoints and resorts.

Arrive at Mangalore, a sea-side city set in one of the wettest sections of the Western Ghats. From here, the road climbs the Ghats to the city of Madikeri, the capital of Kodagu district. While the city centre is expectedly crowded, there are some attractive views from its outskirts. Just 7km from the city centre, the Abby Falls are spectacularly situated among plantations walk down to the bridge that offers the finest view of the cascading water, most impressive in the rains. Madikeri's other worthwhile points

are Raja's Seat and the Fort, which has a church converted into a museum.

A short drive from Madikeri, Vivanta by Taj Coorg offers views from its lobby, which is set on a hilltop in the heart of a 180-acre rainforest. The lobby offers access to many facilities like an indoor swimming pool and spa. From the lobby, carts take you to cottages set among greenery, each one offering splendid seclusion in its own courtyard and wide ranging luxuries. Another exciting place to stay near Madikeri Heritage Resort is perched on a hilltop with a swimming pool set on the hillside offering a magnificent mountain view. Orange County is a sprawling resort with a plantation experience. Those looking for tranquility could also stay at one of the coffee plantations.

#### Mussoorie

#### A heritage honeymoon

At an altitude of over 6000ft above sea level, Mussoorie is a popular hill station that attracts great crowds in summer and winter. During the monsoon, it is relatively quiet and can be a good getaway with many eateries.

The highlight of Mussoorie is its heritage hotels, dating from the days when British officers, *Maharajas, Nawabs* and *Zamindars* built their summer palaces at this hill town.

From Dehradun, head to Mussoorie and take the road past Hathipaon to Cloudend, which was a British cottage taken over by a planter family from Dehradun. The forests quaver with birdcalls and the surroundings are lush green during the rains. Cloudend was built for the same reason as the Taj Mahal - as a sign of love. The story goes that Major Swetenham, during a walk in the mountains, heard the most melodious singing and followed the voice till he came upon the singer, a beautiful mountain girl. Frightened, the girl sped home, followed by the smitten Major Swetenham. The Major took the permission of girl's father to marry the girl and received the estate as dowry. Swetenham commissioned 500 labourers to build this house for his bride in 1838. Four generations of the Swetenhams went on to live here before it was bought by a planter. Today, it is a small nature resort.

From here, you can head for Mussoorie, which has one of India's oldest hill station hotels. One such hotel is - The Savoy, opened by Cecil D. Lincoln, an Irish barrister, in 1902, where emperors, princesses, authors and prime ministers have stayed. Now WelcomHotel The Savoy, its majestic old oaks, gardens, impressive building and the memorabilia inside, make this a great place for heritage loving couples. If you are looking for a getaway, Carlton's Plaisance is an attractive orchard mansion that belonged to a family from Lucknow with French influences. The *Maharaja* of Rajpipla's estate, Padmini Niwas, is a hotel popular with Gujaratis visiting Mussoorie because it serves *thalis*. Another heritage hotel nearby is Roselyn Estate, named after an Australian resident of Mussoorie. Claridges Nabha Resort, once a retreat of Punjabi princes, retains its old world charm.

For a princely experience, head for Welcomheritage Kasmanda Palace Hotel that is one of the oldest buildings of Mussoorie. The hotel was once a part of Christchurch Complex built in 1836 by Captain Rennie Tailour of the Bengal Engineers. It subsequently became a Sanatorium for the British forces. During the latter part of the century, it was one of the first schools to be set up at Mussoorie when this hill station town, like other mountain resorts of the Raj, became an important educational centre for British children and royal families. The *Rajas* of Kasmanda took over this property in 1915 and made it into a summer retreat from their principality near Lucknow. The interiors are full of colonial period furniture and antique artifacts.

#### **Periyar Lake** A getaway for the adventurous couple

Forget the beaches, hill stations or backwaters of Kerala, if you are looking for seclusion in style, it is hard to beat the Lake Palace on an island of Periyar Lake.

From Cochin Airport, the drive to Thekkady is breathtaking as you go past tea estates, forested slopes, seasonal streams and waterfalls at their best in the monsoon. Thekkady marks the entrance to the Periyar Tiger Reserve. Once past the check post, go through fine forests where Nilgiri langur, sambar deer, Indian bison and giant squirrel are often seen. From the jetty, boats take you to the Lake Palace - scan the shores of lake through binoculars to look for wildlife like wild elephant, deer, wild boar and otter. The palace was once the retreat of the *Maharaja* of Travancore and its architecture is in classic Keralan style. Stay in huge high-ceilinged rooms, and enjoy quiet dinners in the dining room.

When you get into the mood for adventure, Periyar offers treks, boat safaris, bamboo rafting and wildlife walks. You can also visit spice gardens, tea plantations and villages nearby.

#### West Sikkim

#### Paradise in the mountains

West Sikkim's breathtaking beauty has few equals - evergreen alpine forests, waterfalls, rivers, seasonal streams and flowering meadows are part of the lovely landscapes in the monsoon and on a clear day, you can see the sublime Kanchenjunga Peaks towering over the area.

While Pelling has become a popular destination, where you can find serenity at Rinchenpong (also spelt Rinchengpong). From Bagdogra Airport, the road runs along the Teesta and Rangeet Rivers, and then goes past the foliage of pine, Himalayan alder, chestnut, magnolia, rhododendrons, cherry trees as it rises towards Rinchenpong. There are impressive monsoon waterfalls, at places absolutely delightful gossamer curtain of water drench your car as you go along.

Yangsum Heritage Farm is one of the nicest places to stay in Rinchenpong, with a farmhouse built in 1833 and remodeled in 1966. The homestay is run by Thendup Tashi and Pema, in the midst of a 44-acre mountain farm. The rooms are attractive with touch of Sikkimese culture and the food features many local specialties. From here, you can stroll out to forests, farmlands and scenic spots. If you are in the mood for some culture, the monastery and historic places in the village are worth visiting.

You could also take an excursion to the medieval monastery of Pemayangtse, which offers superb sceneries and is rich in art.

# EXPLORE AHMEDABAD

India's first UNESCO World Heritage City

> For more than 600 years, Ahmedabad has been an epitome of peace and unity. It is the city where Mahatma Gandhi began freedom struggle of India. India's only UNESCO World Heritage City has some of the finest monuments and exquisite architectural tradition.

The living heritage of the city is reflected in its 600 odd *pols*, which are serving as residence for many centuries. The carved wooden houses of Walled City are yet another architectural tradition.

The lanes and bylanes of Ahmedabad Walled City offer a sense of living heritage, culture and architecture through the *Ahmedabad Heritage Walk* organized by Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation.

he Ahmedabad Heritage Walk was started on 19th November, 1997 as a joint initiative of the Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation and NGOs. The walking tour was conceptualized by Debashish Nayak, an architect and heritage activist who believed that such an activity would create pride among residents of the *pols* in heritage. Says Chandrashekhar Solanki, who was among the first volunteers of the Ahmedabad Heritage Walk, "The most noteworthy feature of the Ahmedabad Heritage Walk is that it has a guaranteed departure there is hardly a day when this walking tour has been cancelled because of absence of a voluntary guide or lack of participants". "This was the first of its kind, because most of the heritage walks in other cities occurred only during specific heritage, tourism or art festivals," says Debashish Nayak.

The walk begins at the Swaminarayan Temple, the first built by Sahajanand Swamy or Lord Swaminarayan who was

born in Uttar Pradesh in 1792 and undertook a spiritual journey of India before making Gujarat his home. This temple was constructed in 1822 on the land gifted by the British Imperial Government. It has fine carvings and murals that tell many historical and mythological stories.

From here, the participants are guided to Kavi Dalpatram

Chowk, named after a wellknown Gujarati poet. The platform is used for performances on special occasions and for poetry recitals.

After this, the walk leads through the *Haja Patel Ni Pol*. The *pols* of Ahmedabad have narrow lanes lined with two and three storey houses, each featuring overhanging balconies. The *havelis*, which had courtyards and ventilation outlets to allow a good airflow through the residential areas, were clustered together to keep

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**Chabutra or Bird Feeders** -

their interiors free of extreme heat and direct sunlight. Water was harvested in wells and sealed tanks, called *tankas*. Hollow niches have been provided in walls for squirrels and birds who find little shelter in these largely treeless neighbourhoods. *Chabutras* or bird feeding structures is yet another fascinating feature of a *pol*.

The walk includes a number of temples – the *Kala Ramji Mandir*, which has Lord Ram with Sita, Hanuman and Lakshman, and Jain temples that have beautiful vegetable dyed walls, wood or stone carvings and corbelled hollow domes or spires featuring woodcarvings in concentric circles rising to a pendant in the centre of the dome.

In a lane called *Kuvavala Khancha*, you can see elements of Persian, Mughal, Maratha and European architecture reflecting the respective periods in which each façade was built and had emblems of the earlier owners

above the doors. Some of the motifs on walls show important social changes - for example, there is a carving of a woman reading a book to denote the importance of girl child education and another shows a boy and girl studying together to show coeducation.

The walk goes past many magnificent houses, including *Harkuvarba Shethani Ni Haveli*, which is about 92-yearold and still partially occupied, with fine stonework and an American water pump. Islamic architecture includes the mausoleum of Sultan Ahmed Shah, a fine example of 15th century architecture and *Rani No Haziro*, the tombs of the Sultan's harem, which now houses a market.

The walk continues through markets for handicrafts, fabrics, prayer objects, jewellery, stationary and metalwork, and you could catch the morning activity in the bullion market of Manek Chowk.

It ends at the Jama Masjid, built in 1423-24. This impressive mosque has a spacious marble paved courtyard with galleries on three sides and the superbly proportioned façade of the prayer hall rising on the fourth. The prayer hall has 260 columns and is covered with domes. The mosque also has a zanana, a latticework gallery set aside for women, rising on beams.

Says Girish Gupta, a heritage activist, "This walking tour has created much pride and interest among the local people and visitors alike in Ahmedabad's rich heritage. Following this, House of Mangaldas has promoted an audio walking tour from their heritage hotel to haveli café passing through a variety of heritage sites and a night walk in the walled city to see living traditions. Other walks like the Gandhi Trail and Freedom Fighter's Trail have also been designed for special occasion heritage tours. The heritage initiatives have got many people interested in preserving Ahmedabad's heritage sites.

#### How has Medical Tourism evolved over the past few years? What kind of trends can be envisioned?

India is known mostly for its cost-effective medical treatments along with high standards in cardiology, orthopaedics, nephrology, oncology and neuro surgery.

#### Chennai, Kolkata, Mumbai, Hyderabad, Bangalore are top destinations for foreign visitors for medical tourism. Why do you think Gujarat is lagging behind?

Flight connectivity, cosmopolitan culture including food & beverages in cities like Chennai, Kolkata, Mumbai, Hyderabad and Bangalore are the contributing factors, resulting in relatively more influx of medical tourists to these cities. There are fewer direct flights connecting Ahmedabad from many countries. And there is no direct flight from African countries to Ahmedabad. Besides, the city also lacks in cosmopolitan culture.

#### Talking about Apollo Hospitals, how many foreign patients are treated every year?

For those who like jogging and walking, the Gave de Pau river bank is an excellent footpath for a walk that starts near the castle and passes along Pau's golf course heading west. Another spot is Pont-Long wood, north of the town. The SUAPS climbing wall is the highest climbing wall of Aquitaine and Midi-Pyrénées. It is a top place for Pyrénéan climbing training. Pau is also the base for countryside hiking and treks.

The town of Pau has long been a center of activity for French canoe slalom. The natural rapids in the center of town are still equipped with hanging slalom gates. However, the sport is most often conducted in the artificial white waters of Whitewater Stadium of Pau-Pyrénées, which is a man-made basin fed by the Gave de Pau. It is also a whitewater park for recreational use by the general public.

If you like basketball, plan watching a game at the Palais des Sports de Pau,



which is an indoor arena that can accommodate 7,707 spectators. The largest basketball facility in France is a home ground of the Élan Béarnais Pau-Orthez. It is one of the most prestigious French sporting clubs and often hosts national level championships. Rugby matches can be watched at the Hamlet Stadium, a 13,966-seat stadium with two covered grandstands, a fitness room and a club house. Fencing, baseball, soccer, American football, handball and other sports are also played at competitive levels in Pau. A popular regional sport is Basque pelota, court sports played with a ball using one hand, racket, bat or basket, against a wall, on the ground or on two sides of a net. Canoeing championships, Marathon de Pau and the walking race called Feminine de Pau are regular features at Pau. The city has also hosted tennis, gymnastics, parachute jumping and chess championships. Pau and Pyrenees often host the Tour de France, one of the world's leading cycle races.

### EQUESTRIAN SPORTS

Pau is excellent for those who love horse-riding. The region is proud of its equine traditions from the mountain pony breed used in the Pyrenees to having one of France's first stud farms. There are many riding farms in and around Pau, which offer riding facilities. Pony treks are offered by operators in farms in the countryside and in the Pyrenees hills. The CentreEquestre d'Orthez, the Club Hippique de Lescar and La Cavilier at Sailes de Bearne are destinations for horse-riding enthusiasts.

For watching races, the historical Pau Racecourse attracts more than 50,000 spectators on race days from December until mid-February. The equestrian field of Sers is one of the top European courses for steeplechase. The Étoiles de Pau or Stars of Pau is a 3-day event held in Pau that is one of the highest level of competition in equestrian eventing. Each horse and owner compete others across the three disciplines of dressage, cross-country and show jumping. Held annually in October, it is one of the only six annual competitions in eventing that receive the highest rating of CCI\*\*\*\* from equestrianism's world governing body, the FEI. It's also the only event of this level in France.

Another horse-related sport that is exciting to watch is mock fox hunting. The fox hunt clubhouse dates back to 1890 and is like a museum of fox hunting memorabilia. Fortunately, for the fox and animal lovers, the days of the blood sport of fox-hunting is over, and this is now a place for those who love horses and dogs. A fox-hunting demonstration is also organized for the guests. A scent is dragged over a trail and a pack of foxhounds released to race towards the 'drag'. Riders go in pursuit, jumping over stiles, gates and ditches, and in the end kennel the hounds.





### MOTOR SPORTS

For true adrenaline-pumping excitement, the Pau Arnos circuit racing track for automobile and motorcycles is up to 3030m long. The nearby kart track is up to 900m long. The facility hosts track days, test drives, competitions and a race driver school. Sip coffee on the terrace and watch powerful cars taking on the circuit. Don helmets, gloves, race suits and boots before getting into a saloon or an open legend car with an experienced driver at the wheel for an exhilarating drive on the circuit. The Pau Grand Prix is a spectacular event for those who love cars.



Pau is an important aviation centre from the days of the Wright Brothers. In January 1909, the Wright family arrived in Pau. The first flight on the "Flyer" took place on 3rd February, 1909. The flying school, founded by the Wright Brothers, was entrusted to Paul Tissandier who, for some time, continued to train civil and military pilots. After becoming the first man to fly across the English Channel in his Blériot XI monoplane on 25th July, 1909, Blériot came back to Pau and opened his own flying school in November of that year.

> The Aéro-Club du Béarn, the oldest Aero-Club of France, was founded by Paul Tissandier in December 1908 to approve the flights that the Wright Brothers were to perform in Pau. This club conducts air sports. The weather and conditions of Pau make this a favoured destination for parachuting. The Pau-Lasclaveries parachuting club

is the place for free fall baptism alone or in tandem. Admiring the peak of the Midday of Ossau or the chain of the Pyrenees at a height of 4000m is an extraordinary experience and Club Pau Skydive offers you complete training to obtain your parachutist's certificate.

The Pau Pyrénées Air Club (CHP), founded in 2004, is a club dedicated to aerobatics. It is located in the Pau Pyrénées airport sheds.

#### MOUNTAIN SPORTS IN THE PYRENEES

From Pau, you can take the road to the Pyrenees, a range of mountains that forms a natural border between France and Spain. Reaching at a height of 11,168 ft., the Pyrenees is excellent for alpine sports like skiing, trekking, mountaineering, whitewater rafting, mountain cycling, pony treks, body boards, rock climbing, potholing and canyoning.

Treks range from exploration of the valleys, foothills and cultural trips to meeting shepherds, exploring historic places, and travelling through magnificent high routes like the one circuiting from the Cirque de Gavarnie to the Orodesa Canyon, rich in alpine wildlife. Rocky crags and mountain tops combine with sleepy villages and river valleys making terrain a pure delight. Some of the trails involve

> rough walking on high and remote mountains. Summer is the best season for trekking.

In winter, you can enjoy snow and ice-sports. One hour by train or taxi from Pau, Gourette is one of the convenient places for winter sports. There are activities like ski lessons, a choice of about 27 skiing runs, ski lifts and tows, snow shoe trekking trails and other snow activities.

Cauterets is a winter sports resort where one can enjoy downhill skiing and cross country skiing. There are 36 km of cross country tracks at Pont d'Espagne and 25 downhill pistes at Cirque du Lys between 5,600 ft and 8,200 ft altitude, which are mainly suited for beginners and intermediates. A new cable car was built in 2005, which can transport 2000 skiers per hour to the Cirque du Lys area.

Some of the region's top winter sports are in the Vallee du Baretous where the La Pierre Saint-Martin ski station provides perfect conditions for activities such as skiing, tobogganing, snow shoeing, mountain biking and scooter riding on the snow, snow tubing and big airbag.

There are also places for more difficult levels of skiing.

The Pyrenees range has a wealth of rivers to practice canoeing, kayaking, rafting, hot dogging, white water swimming, kayak polo and other sports. These rivers are good for rafting or kayaking. Torrentuous stretches of the river can be challenging for the white water enthusiast.

Rivers like the Gave de Pau, Gave d'Oloron, Gave d'Aspe, Gave d'Ossau and Mauléon are also exciting for anglers who like fly fishing.

### GOLFING

Interestingly, Pau has the oldest golf course outside Scotland in the world. Built in 1856 for British expats, this course has been extended over the years to become an 18-hole golf course with a historical club, pro shop and

golf school. The clubhouse has a museum which stores antique golf clubs, golfing memorabilia, paintings and pictures of the days when only the British could play golf here and the French boys were caddies. The dining room and bar are superb setting for a drink or a meal. For golfers, the course is attractive with mature trees and river views from many points. Another golfing facility at Pau Artiguelouve is a highly rated 18-hole golf course.



#### SURFING AND WATER SPORTS

From the Pyrenees, the roads slope down to the Basque coastline, which has splendid places for surfing, water skiing, jet ski, kayak surf, fly board and other water sports. The Biarritz Grand Plage, Chambre d'Amour, Hendaye Plage, La Barre, La Côte des Basques and Plage des Basque are among the popular places for surfing. Biarritz is a luxurious seaside destination where a tourist can combine a holiday with world-class surfing. One of the Biarritz has two main surf beaches. La Grande Plage is known for its hollow waves and suits all standards. The town has a strong surfing culture and is known worldwide for its surfing scene and the competitions. Basque pelota, rugby and golf are other sports of this town. The ports of La Rochelle and Rochefort are very attractive for yacht sailing.
