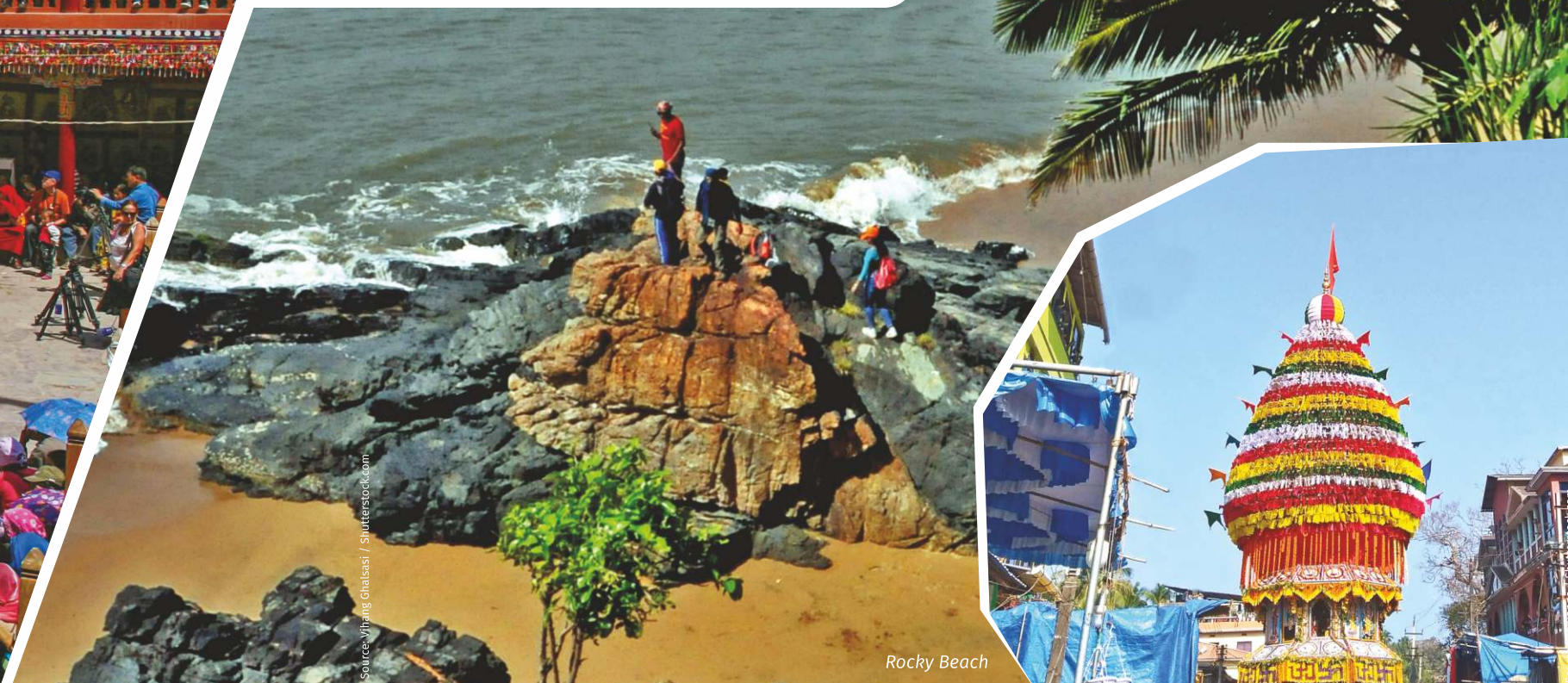

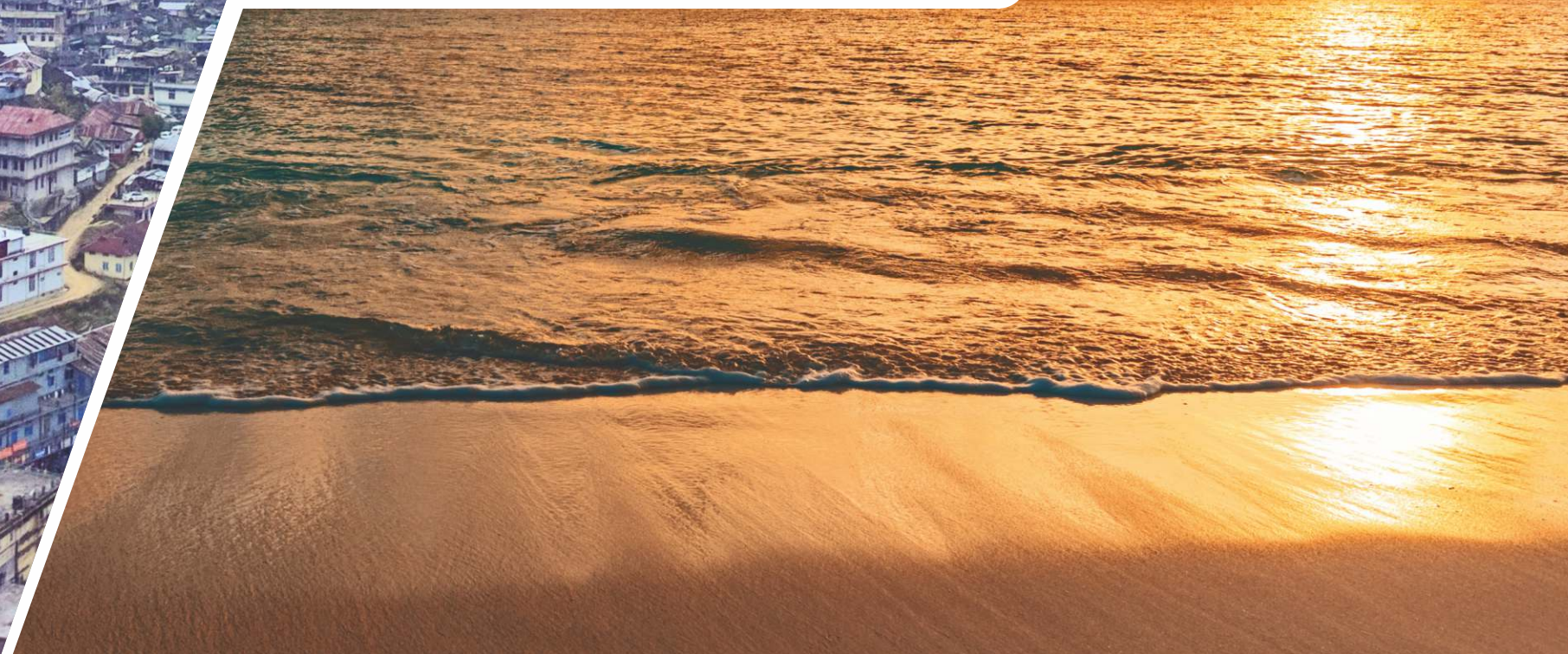

Tale of Two Backpackers

Agni and Amrita

Travel has made us realise the great wonders of the world as well as the little joys of life. We have travelled across many places and seen many cultures and we have learnt to accept difference and diversity with an open mind. Moreover, travelling has awarded us with an infinite dose of patience and empathy.



Here is a tale of two backpackers. They never get tired of the journey because they not only love but live their journey. Speaking exclusively to Tourism One, Agni and Amrita share their experiences and adventures of world tourism. They are true-blue travellers who believe that travelling inadvertently broadens their horizon and makes them more accepting and empathetic. During our conversation, we came to know about an important fact: people are inherently good. Agni and Amrita are a working couple, smoothly handling their professional goals and personal passion. On their trips, they face many unpredictable situations, but they witnessed that kindness of strangers is more powerful than those troubles. In Jammu & Kashmir and Arunachal Pradesh, they were up against man-made and natural calamities; however, the immeasurable courage of locals helped them overcome the touch-and-go situations. Read this interview of two dyed-in-the-wool globetrotters who live their life by compass and not clock.

Agniswar and Amrita Q-A

1. **Is travel related to wisdom? I heard a lot of people saying: the more you travel the more wisdom you gain. What is your experience?**
- Yes, of course. The more we travel, the more we see, the more we understand. It opens up a whole new world. As we travel, we get to see other people and places, other cultures and rituals and so many new things. Travelling inadvertently broadens our horizon and makes us more accepting and empathetic. So yes, the more you travel, the more wisdom you get.
- Travel has made us realise the great wonders of the world as well as the little joys of life. We have travelled across many places and seen many cultures and we have learnt to accept difference and diversity with an open mind. Moreover, travelling has awarded us with an infinite dose of patience and empathy.

As a couple we do have conflict of interests and our own squabbles. But we always try to talk to each other and understand what the other wants. Communication is the key to any successful partnership and that goes for life partners as well. We respect each other's choices. We do not try to impose our decisions and choices on the other. If there is a conflict, we sit down and discuss.

2. Full-time jobbers and travelers as well? Is it possible? How do you manage? Doesn't it affect your performance at work?

Yes, it is absolutely possible to be a traveler while having a full time job. We have managed it for the last 12 years and will continue doing so.

Even as working individuals, we have made travel a priority in our lives. We usually take three long leaves in a year around the holiday seasons. These long leaves are usually for 10 to 15 days and we travel extensively during this time.

Secondly, we utilize the long weekends to the fullest. Adding a day or two makes a long holiday which we utilise for travelling.

We also make full use of our business trips. We usually extend our stay for a few days and explore the place.

Finally, we work hard and travel harder. When we are at our workplace, we concentrate on that. We are good at our job and do not give any reason for complaints to our boss and co-workers. We complete our designated job in time and when that is done, our superiors usually grant us the leaves we ask for.

That is how we have been managing all our travels and hope to do so in future as well.

3. When couples have the same interests, there are countless clashes. Apart from your choice of destinations, what else sets you apart from each other? How do you manage this difference of opinion?

Both of us, by nature, are quite different from each other. While Agni is the extrovert, talkative and gregarious one, I am an introvert. While there are several other differences between us as individuals (from choice of food to choice of music), we also have a lot of mutual interests. And travel is something that we both love.

Yes, as a couple we do have conflict of interests and our own squabbles. But we always try to talk to each other and understand what the other wants. Communication is the key to any successful partnership and that goes for life partners as well. We respect each other's choices. We do not try to impose our decisions and choices on the other. If there is a conflict, we sit down and discuss.

Being in a relationship does not always mean that we have to do the same thing together always. If there is something that one of us wants to do on our own, we do encourage each other. Endless trust, loyalty and love make us click.

4. A writer and a photographer. Who decides the content topics? How do you reach any conclusion when you are engaged in heated arguments, if any?

The content topics are usually decided by Amrita with valuable inputs from Agni. Amrita is the writer and she has the full freedom to present the topic in a way she seems fit. Agni is the photographer and he takes photos and videos in his own unique way. It is both of our unique perspectives on a topic that makes it work with our readers and viewers.

We do have our difference of opinions regarding how the content is going to be presented. But we hardly have any heated argument regarding our content decision. If we have any disagreement, we sit down and discuss it with each other.

5. You have faced a lot of unpredictable troubles during your travels. What lessons did you learn from those situations?

Yes, we have faced a lot of unpredictable situations on the road. And the most important thing that we learned from these situations is the inherent goodness of people. Whenever you face trouble, you will inevitably find someone who will help you.

We were once stuck in a communal riot while travelling in Jammu and Kashmir. There was a curfew all around. In that critical time, the local people opened up their homes for us and gave us shelter for the night.

There is another instance where I was stuck at the highway in Arunachal Pradesh (I was travelling alone at that time) as the cab broke down on the road. There too the locals helped me reach my destination safely.

6. You follow Stephen Covey's famous quote, "Live your life by a compass, not a clock". Was there any situation in your life when the clock conquered the compass?

Well, we try to live our life by the compass. And that does not only mean that we are travelling. It also means that we try to lead our life in a direction. We do not tend to just pass another day, but try to live it fully.

While time is very important, life should not only be about deadlines and routines. It should be a mix of punctuality and creativity. We respect time, but do not always let it dictate our everyday life.

7. What is the current scenario of ecotourism in India? Tell us about its potential in our country.

India has a lot of potential for ecotourism because of its abundant natural and cultural wealth. Every state in India is rich in both natural and human resources. At present, ecotourism is at a growing stage in the country. We have seen many of our acquaintances opting for alternative stays like homestay and eco stays rather than traditional hotels. People are more focussed on experiences, rather than just ticking off bucket lists. This is quite a positive trend towards development of ecotourism.

Sustainable tourism is the need of the day, as the focus should be on preserving the ecosystems, natural resources while giving the benefits to the local communities. The potential of growth is there, but it has to be developed in a careful way so that the local communities and nature are not exploited.

We have seen some great ecotourism practices at Bastar, Northeast India, Madhya Pradesh and the Kutch region of Gujarat. We hope that the other states also take measures towards sustainability and growth of tourism. ¹⁰

Ministry of Tourism endeavors to position India as a preferred tourism destination

July 2023 - As per provisional data received from Bureau of Immigration, the Foreign Tourist Arrivals (FTAs) in India during January to April 2023 reached 79% of FTAs during the same period in 2019. The Ministry of Tourism endeavors to position India as a preferred tourism destination in the tourism generating markets to promote various tourism products and destinations and to increase India's share in the global tourism market. The objectives are met through an integrated marketing and promotional strategy and a synergized campaign in association with the Travel Trade, State Governments and Indian Missions overseas.

The Ministry of Tourism has been working very closely with Ministry of Home Affairs and Ministry of External Affairs for easing of the Visa Regime in the country. e-Visa scheme is now available to the nationals of 166 countries and it is available in five



categories - e-Tourist Visa, e-Business Visa, e-Medical Visa, e-Conference Visa and e-Medical Attendant Visa e-Visa is

valid for entry through 29 designated Airports and 5 designated seaports.

July 2023 - During India's G-20 Presidency, more than 200 meetings are planned at over 60 locations across the country. All these destinations have attracted global attention and put India on the global tourism map. G20 meetings have fostered collaboration between governments, private sector

and other stakeholders to provide a memorable experience for the G20 delegates visiting India. Infrastructure has been upgraded at the host cities and various initiatives have been taken up for building the capacity of stakeholders for successful conduct of the event.

The Ministry of Tourism also inked several significant Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) during the Tourism Working Group Meetings, paving way for development and promotion of the tourism sector in the country.

Reddy extends a warm invitation to US firms to invest in India's flourishing tourism sector

July 2023 - During his five-day visit to New York, Union Minister for Culture, Tourism, and Development of the North Eastern Region (DoNER), G Kishan Reddy, urged US firms and companies to consider investing in India's robust and diverse tourism sector. The Minister seized the opportunity to make this appeal while addressing a community reception organized by the Consulate General of India in New York.

In a tweet on July 13, the minister revealed that he is scheduled to deliver a keynote address at the ongoing High-Level Political Forum at the UN headquarters on Friday (July 14), along with participating in several official and community engagements.

Additionally, Reddy enthusiastically promoted investment in the tourism industry, assuring that both the government and his Ministry would extend a warm welcome and provide full support to US companies and any other individuals interested in participating in India's flourishing tourist sector.



India - the largest source market for Sri Lanka's tourism industry

July 2023 - According to Chalaka Gajabahu, Chairman of Sri Lanka Tourism Promotion Bureau (SLTPB), India holds the top position as the largest market for tourism arrivals in Sri Lanka, and this trend is expected to persist in

the long run. The SLTPB is the government entity responsible for managing all marketing and promotional endeavors for the beautiful island nation.

By the end of June, the number of

tourist arrivals from India reached 1.16 lakhs, contributing to the total tourist arrivals of 6.24 lakhs in Sri Lanka. India had retained its position as the primary source market in 2022 with 1.23 lakh tourist arrivals. 10

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
